

LESSONS FROM FINLAND WITH SCHOOL VISITS - 10 DAYS **COURSE**

Introduction and Description

This course provides a comprehensive and research-informed exploration of the Finnish education system through a balanced combination of theoretical study, structured school observations, and applied pedagogical workshops. Participants investigate the core principles underpinning Finland's internationally recognised success, including equity-driven policy design, learner-centred methodology, formative assessment culture, teacher autonomy, and a holistic approach to student wellbeing. School visits offer authentic insight into how these principles manifest in everyday practice, allowing participants to analyse organisational structures, classroom environments, teaching methods, and assessment strategies directly on site.

Through guided reflection, comparative analysis, and collaborative project work, participants critically examine the transferability of Finnish pedagogical models to diverse European educational contexts. The course supports educators in developing informed, context-sensitive strategies for innovation and improvement within their own institutions. By the end of the programme, participants will have formed a nuanced understanding of Finnish educational philosophy and designed actionable plans to integrate selected practices in meaningful and sustainable ways.

Methodology and Assessment

The course employs an integrated methodology combining expert input, case studies, structured school visits, collaborative workshops, outdoor experiential learning, and guided reflection. Participants engage in observation, dialogue with Finnish practitioners, micro-teaching tasks, and project-based learning. Emphasis is placed on linking theory with real-life practice and supporting participants in contextualising Finnish approaches within their own educational settings.

Assessment is continuous and formative, based on active participation, reflective journals, observation templates, group activities, and a final presentation of an implementation plan. Feedback focuses on pedagogical insight, reflective depth, and the practical applicability of proposed innovations.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, participants will be able to:

Knowledge & Understanding

- Understand the organisational, curricular, and policy foundations of the Finnish education system and the principles guiding its success.
- Analyse learner-centred, inquiry-based, and outdoor pedagogical approaches as practiced in Finnish schools.
- Examine formative assessment tools and strategies used to promote autonomy, motivation, and individual progression.
- Compare Finnish educational structures with participants' national systems through evidence-informed reflection.

Skills & Competences

- Observe, interpret, and evaluate authentic classroom and school practices using structured tools and analytical frameworks.
- Design pedagogical interventions inspired by Finnish approaches, adapting them to local needs, resources, and cultural contexts.
- Develop action plans for school-level or classroom-level innovation grounded in insights from school visits and theoretical study.
- Engage in collaborative problem-solving and reflective dialogue to deepen pedagogical understanding and support professional growth.

Attitudes

- Cultivate an open, reflective, and inquiry-oriented mindset toward educational innovation.
- Demonstrate readiness to explore alternative pedagogical models and adapt them responsibly and contextually.

Preparation

After registration participants will receive pre-course questionnaire which will be used by the trainer to learn about participants' teaching backgrounds and to assess their exact needs. Before the beginning of the course a basic reading list will be suggested to participants to prepare for the training. Participants will also be asked to prepare a presentation about themselves, their professional context and their culture. The presentation will be presented on the first day of the course to facilitate networking opportunities. Participants will receive information about the country they are going to visit in order to prepare them for their cultural experience.

Follow up

After the course participants will be asked to share what they have learned with the rest of the staff in their schools. Further books and articles to deepen the topic and contacts with some other practitioners all over Europe and in the world will be suggested by the trainer. The methods shared and explored and the bibliography given will allow the participants to complete and improve their educational path.

Certificate

Certificate complies with the guidelines of the Erasmus+ programme and includes the topic, number of didactic hours, dates and location of the course. We can list the record of learning outcomes on the Europass Mobility Document on request of participants. In case a participant requires a specific format of certificate we can accommodate that if requested at least one week before the start of the course. It is necessary to attend at least 80% of the hours in order to receive the certificate.

We do not directly offer accommodation and subsistence and participants are responsible for organizing it by themselves.
