

CULTURAL HERITAGE IN ACTION (RELATING PAST TO PRESENT THROUGH EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING, STUDY VISITS AND SIMULATIONS) - 5 DAYS COURSE

Introduction & Description

This intensive 5-day teacher training course examines cultural heritage as a multidimensional educational resource through a highly experiential format combining theoretical grounding with three structured study visits. The course investigates how tangible and intangible heritage reflect and transmit values, beliefs, knowledge and traditions, and how these elements can be used pedagogically to foster intercultural understanding, critical thinking and civic engagement.

Participants explore cultural heritage in situ through guided fieldwork, observation, documentation, short interviews and sensory mapping, working directly with heritage sites, local custodians and living cultural practitioners. Drawing on these experiences, the course introduces teachers to inquiry-based learning, object-based learning, embodied learning and simulation techniques for integrating heritage into formal and non-formal educational contexts.

Sessions on pedagogical simulations and re-enactments support participants in analysing how narrative, perspective-taking and role-play deepen learners' engagement with the past and its relevance to contemporary identities. The course also develops digital and media literacy skills by guiding participants through the creation of photo stories, audio narratives or short educational videos based on their fieldwork.

Through individual reflection, group collaboration and hands-on project development, participants acquire practical strategies for designing heritage-based learning activities that connect past and present, stimulate curiosity, and promote respect for cultural diversity. By the end of the programme, participants will be equipped to embed cultural heritage education into a range of curricular areas, age groups and learning environments.

Methodology and Assessment

The course uses an experiential, inquiry-based methodology supported by structured study visits. Participants engage directly with cultural heritage through guided fieldwork, using observation grids, sensory mapping, interviews and photographic documentation to explore how values, beliefs and traditions are expressed in tangible and intangible heritage. Classroom sessions with object-based learning, short simulations and digital media production deepen interpretation and support creative,

student-centred applications. Learning is collaborative and reflective throughout. Assessment is continuous and formative, based on participation in fieldwork and group activities, completion of documentation tasks, a small heritage project presented on the final day, and brief reflective entries demonstrating learning and plans for classroom use.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the 5-day course, participants will be able to:

Understanding Cultural Heritage

- Demonstrate a clear understanding of key concepts related to tangible and intangible cultural heritage, cultural identity, memory and transmission.
- Analyse how heritage expresses and preserves values, beliefs, knowledge and traditions within different communities.

Fieldwork & Inquiry Skills

- Apply basic fieldwork methods (observation grids, sensory mapping, interviews, photographic documentation) to analyse cultural heritage sites and practices.
- Interpret and synthesise information gathered during study visits, identifying connections between past and present.
- Formulate inquiry questions and structure small-scale heritage investigations for use with learners.

Pedagogical Application

- Design learning activities that use cultural heritage as a stimulus for cross-curricular learning, creativity, critical thinking and intercultural dialogue.
- Implement experiential methods such as object-based learning, embodied learning, role-play and simulations to deepen understanding of cultural perspectives and historical contexts.

Media & Digital Competence

- Produce educational media outputs (photo stories, videos, audio narratives or digital exhibits) that represent cultural heritage accurately and ethically.
- Use digital tools to document, interpret and communicate cultural heritage based on materials collected during field trips.

Educational Project Development & Reflection

- Design a small-scale cultural heritage project suitable for classroom or school-wide use, grounded in inquiry and reflective practice.
- Critically evaluate their own learning and pedagogical choices, recognising cultural biases and considering inclusive and ethically responsible approaches to heritage education.
- Demonstrate increased confidence in facilitating heritage-based learning in both formal and non-formal educational settings.

Preparation

After registration participants will receive pre-course questionnaire which will be used by the trainer to learn about participants' teaching backgrounds and to assess their exact needs. Before the beginning of the course a basic reading list will be suggested to participants to prepare for the training. Participants will also be asked to prepare a presentation about themselves, their professional context and their culture. The presentation will be presented on the first day of the course to facilitate networking opportunities. Participants will receive information about the country they are going to visit in order to prepare them for their cultural experience.

Follow up

After the course participants will be asked to share what they have learned with the rest of the staff in their schools. Further books and articles to deepen the topic and contacts with some other practitioners

all over Europe and in the world will be suggested by the trainer. The methods shared and explored and the bibliography given will allow the participants to complete and improve their educational path.

Certificate

Certificate complies with the guidelines of the Erasmus+ programme and includes the topic, number of didactic hours, dates and location of the course. We can list the record of learning outcomes on the Europass Mobility Document on request of participants. In case a participant requires a specific format of certificate we can accommodate that if requested at least one week before the start of the course. It is necessary to attend at least 80% of the hours in order to receive the certificate.

Accommodation

We do not directly offer accommodation and subsistence and participants are responsible for organizing it by themselves.

We also provide all the support with paperwork you might need for your Erasmus+ project documentation such as mobility agreement and registration letter.

Cancelation policy
