

LEARNING ENGLISH THE FUN WAY: Intermediate (A2 & B1) - 10 DAYS COURSE

Introduction and Description

This course is designed to enhance the English language proficiency of teachers working at A2–B1 levels through experiential, engaging, and communicative learning environments. Rooted in contemporary approaches to second-language acquisition, the programme emphasises authentic use of English, meaningful interaction, and the gradual development of lexical, grammatical, and pragmatic competence.

The training integrates multiple stimulating contexts—storytelling, simulations, outdoor learning, city exploration, art interpretation, and cultural inquiry—to support immersion in real-life language situations. Each module provides rich opportunities for participants to expand their receptive and productive skills, improve fluency and accuracy, and increase confidence in using English for personal, professional, and intercultural communication.

Additionally, the course fosters a supportive community of practice where teachers continuously negotiate meaning, co-construct narratives, solve communicative tasks, and engage in reflective dialogue. By combining interactive tasks with scaffolded language input, the course ensures participants strengthen all four skills while experiencing English as a dynamic, enjoyable, and socially meaningful language.

Methodology and Assessment

The course uses a communicative, experiential, and task-based methodology that immerses participants in real-life English use through storytelling, simulations, outdoor exploration, city hunts, art interpretation, and collaborative projects. Learning is driven by interaction, meaningful tasks, and scaffolded language input that supports both fluency and accuracy while maintaining a motivating, low-anxiety environment. Assessment is continuous and formative, based on active participation in speaking and writing tasks, project work, and final presentations. Feedback focuses on communicative effectiveness, clarity, vocabulary development, and grammatical control, while self-reflection helps participants monitor progress and set ongoing language goals.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, participants will be able to:

Language Knowledge & Communication

1. Demonstrate increased confidence and competency in spoken English across a range of everyday and semi-professional contexts.
2. Use an expanded vocabulary related to daily life, cultural topics, art, storytelling, travel, and collaborative tasks.
3. Apply improved grammatical control appropriate for A2–B1 communication, with particular emphasis on functional structures, past tenses, modal verbs, and connectors.
4. Employ enhanced pronunciation, stress, rhythm, and intonation patterns to ensure clearer intelligibility.

Listening, Reading, Speaking, Writing Skills

5. Understand short spoken and written texts with greater ease and extract essential information for communicative tasks.
6. Engage in extended conversations, discussions, and problem-solving activities using coherent and comprehensible English.
7. Produce written descriptions, narratives, and summaries with improved cohesion and accuracy.
8. Interpret artworks, cultural elements, and real-life settings through descriptive and inferential language in English.

Intercultural and Reflective Competence

9. Participate in authentic communication situations during outdoor tasks, city hunts, and inquiry-based projects, demonstrating appropriate linguistic and intercultural behaviour.
10. Identify personal language strengths and areas for continued development, setting realistic goals for sustained improvement beyond the course.

Preparation

After registration participants will receive pre-course questionnaire which will be used by the trainer to learn about participants' teaching backgrounds and to assess their exact needs. Before the

beginning of the course a basic reading list will be suggested to participants to prepare for the training. Participants will also be asked to prepare a presentation about themselves, their professional context and their culture. The presentation will be presented on the first day of the course to facilitate networking opportunities. Participants will receive information about the country they are going to visit in order to prepare them for their cultural experience.

Follow up

After the course participants will be asked to share what they have learned with the rest of the staff in their schools. Further books and articles to deepen the topic and contacts with some other practitioners all over Europe and in the world will be suggested by the trainer. The methods shared and explored and the bibliography given will allow the participants to complete and improve their educational path.

Certificate

Certificate complies with the guidelines of the Erasmus+ programme and includes the topic, number of didactic hours, dates and location of the course. We can list the record of learning outcomes on the Europass Mobility Document on request of participants. In case a participant requires a specific format of certificate we can accommodate that if requested at least one week before the start of the course. It is necessary to attend at least 80% of the hours in order to receive the certificate.

Accommodation

We do not directly offer accommodation and subsistence and participants are responsible for organizing it by themselves.
